Learn about new titles and materials that you can use in your library to integrate fitness, movement and music into current programs.

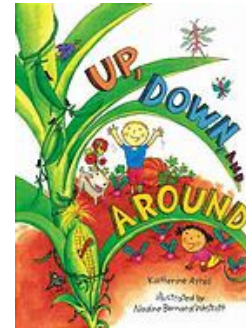
